Oracle Server X8-8 Hardware Accessibility

Oracle Server X8-8 hardware has color-coded labels, component touch points, and status indicators (LEDs) that provide information about the system. These labels, touch points, and indicators can be inaccessible features for sight-impaired users. The product's HTML documentation provides context and descriptive text available to assistive technologies to aid in interpreting status and understanding the system. For information about system-level descriptions, see the *Oracle Server X8-8 Service Manual* at https://www.oracle.com/goto/x8-8/docs.

You can also use the built-in Oracle Integrated Lights Out Manager (ILOM) to obtain information about the system. Oracle ILOM provides a browser-based interface (BUI) and a command-line interface (CLI) that support assistive technologies for real-time viewing of system status, indicator interpretation, and system configuration. For details, see Oracle ILOM Accessibility.

Oracle ILOM Accessibility

You can use the Oracle ILOM BUI to monitor and manage the server hardware. The Oracle ILOM BUI does not require a special accessibility mode; rather, its accessibility features are always available. The BUI was developed using standard HTML and JavaScript and its features conform to accessibility guidelines.

To navigate a BUI page and select items or enter commands, use standard keyboard inputs, such as the Tab key to go to a selection, or the up and down arrow keys to scroll through the page. You can use standard keyboard combinations to make menu selections.

For example, using the Oracle ILOM Open Problems BUI page, you can identify faulted memory modules (DIMMs) or processors (CPUs) that would otherwise be identified by a lighted LED indicator on the motherboard. Likewise, you can use the Oracle ILOM BUI to monitor the hardware power states that are also indicated by flashing LED indicators on the hardware.



The Oracle ILOM CLI is an alternative and equivalent way to access the Oracle ILOM BUI features and functionality. Because the operating systems that run on the Oracle server hardware support assistive technologies to read the content of the screen, you can use the CLI as an equivalent means to access the color-based, mouse-based, and other visual-based utilities that are part of the BUI. For example, you can use a keyboard to enter CLI commands to identify faulted hardware components, check system status, and monitor system health.

You can use the Oracle ILOM Remote Console Plus application to access both a text-based serial console and a graphics-based video console that enable you to remotely redirect host server system keyboard, video, mouse, and storage devices. Note, however, that the Oracle ILOM Java Remote Console Plus does not support scaling of the video frame within the Java application. You need to use assistive technology to enlarge or reduce the content in the Java Remote Console Plus display.

As an alternative method to using the BIOS Setup Utility to configure BIOS settings, Oracle ILOM provides a set of configurable properties that can help you manage the BIOS configuration parameters on an Oracle x86 server. Using Oracle ILOM, you can do the following:

- Back up a copy of the BIOS configuration parameters to an XML file using the Oracle ILOM BUI.
- Edit the XML file using a standard XML editor. The BIOS XML tags correlate directly to the BIOS screen labels.
- Restore the XML file of the backed up or edited configuration parameters to BIOS.

Oracle Hardware Management Pack Accessibility

Oracle Hardware Management Pack software is a set of CLI tools. Oracle Hardware Management Pack software does not include product-specific accessibility features. Using a keyboard, you can run the CLI tools as text commands from the operating system of a supported Oracle server. All output is text-based.

Additionally, most Oracle Hardware Management Pack tools support command output to a text log file or XML file, which can be used for text-to-speech conversion. Accessible man pages are available that describe the Hardware Management Pack tools on the system on which those tools are installed.

You can install and uninstall Oracle Hardware Management Pack by using text commands entered from the CLI. Assistive technology products such as screen readers, digital speech synthesizers, or magnifiers can be used to read the content of the screen.

BIOS Accessibility

When viewing BIOS output from a terminal using the serial console redirection feature, some terminals do not support function key input. However, BIOS supports the mapping of function keys to Control key sequences when serial redirection is enabled. Descriptions of the function



key to Control key sequence mappings are provided in the product documentation, typically within the server Service Manual. You can navigate the BIOS Setup Utility by using either a mouse or keyboard commands.

As an alternative method of configuring BIOS settings using the BIOS Setup Utility screens, Oracle ILOM provides a set of configurable properties that can help you manage the BIOS configuration parameters on an Oracle x86 server. For more information, see Oracle ILOM Accessibility.

BIOS information and its functions are typically documented in the *Oracle Server X8-8 Service Manual* and *Oracle Server X8-8 Installation Guide*.

Documentation Accessibility

Documentation for Oracle hardware is provided in HTML and PDF formats. The HTML documents are accessible using standard operating system controls and assistive technology. CPUs Fail During SFT

Bug ID: 29378829

Issue: On rare occasion, a processor might fail during SFT.

Affected Hardware: Oracle Server X8-8

Workaround: Replace the faulted processor in the Oracle Server X8-8 CMOD.

Oracle ILOM Fails To Boot Due To Internal Error After AC Power Cycle

Bug ID: 29279228

Issue: On rare occasion, after Oracle Server X8-8 AC power cycle, Oracle ILOM fails to boot due to an internal error.

Affected Hardware: Oracle Server X8-8

Workaround: When a power-off condition occurs, press the System A or System B server power button on the host system, or use Oracle ILOM CLI commands to power on the Oracle Server X8-8 host system from a local or remote location. Refer to *Power On the Server* in *Oracle Server X8-8 Service Manual*.



Diagnosing SAS Data Path Failures on Servers Using MegaRAID Disk Controllers

Important Operating Note

On Oracle x86 servers using MegaRAID disk controllers, Serial Attached SCSI (SAS) data path errors can occur. To triage and isolate a data path problem on the SAS disk controller, disk backplane (DBP), SAS cable, SAS expander, or hard disk drive (HDD), gather and review the events in the disk controller event log. Classify and analyze all failure events reported by the disk controller based on the server SAS topology.

To classify a MegaRAID disk controller event:

- Gather and parse the MegaRAID disk controller event logs either by running the automated sundiag utility or manually using the StorCLI command.
 - For Oracle Exadata Database Machine database or storage cell servers, run the sundiag utility.
 - For Oracle Server X8-8, use the StorCLI command.

4-Socket Configuration Controller Event Log

Manually gather and parse the controller event log by using the StorCLI command.

At the root prompt, type:

storcli /c0/eall/sall show errorcounters
Controller=0
Status=Success
Description = Show Drive/Cable Error Counters Succeeded.



Use the existing name of the event log as the name for the disk controller event log. This produces a MegaRAID controller event log with the given file name event.log.

These error counters reflect drive or slot errors separately. The following table contains the drive, and error counter for the driver error and the slot.

8-Socket Configuration Controller Event Log

Manually gather and parse the controller event log by using the StorCLI command.





Use the existing name of the event log as the name for the disk controller event log. This produces a MegaRAID controller event log with the given file name event.log.

A communication fault between the disk and the host bus adapter causes these errors. The presence of these errors, even on a single disk, means there is a data path issue. The RAID controller, SAS cables, SAS expander, or disk backplane might be causing the interruption to the communication in the path between the RAID controller and the disks.

Failure of a Single Server Fan Module Might Impact Performance

Important Operating Note

If a single server fan module fails and the server's operating temperature rises above 30 degrees C (86 degrees F), the performance of the server processors might be reduced.

Remove and Replace a Fan Module Within 30 Seconds

Important Operating Note

When removing and replacing a server fan module, you must complete the entire removal and replacement procedure within 30 seconds in order to maintain adequate cooling within the system. In anticipation of this time limit, prior to starting the replacement procedure, obtain the replacement fan module and verify that the new fan module is ready for installation. Remove and replace only one fan module at a time.

Fan modules are hot-swappable components, with N+1 fan redundancy. Each fan module contains two complete counter-rotating fans with two fan rotors per fan. Fan rotors provide separate tachometer signals so that the fan module reports tach signals to Oracle ILOM. Even if only one fan is faulted within the fan module, the Oracle ILOM service processor detects that fans have failed to spin while the fan module is being removed for replacement. If replacing the fan module is not replaced within 30 seconds of removal, Oracle ILOM will take protective action to shut down the system to prevent thermal damage to the system. This is expected behavior.

Lockstep Memory (Channel) Mode Is Not Supported

Important Operating Note

Oracle Server X8-8 does not support lockstep memory mode, which is also known as double device data correction, or Extended ECC.

MAC Address Mapping to Ethernet Ports

Important Operating Note

A system serial label that displays the MAC ID (and the associated barcode) for the server is attached to the top, front-left side of the Oracle Server X8-8 server disk cage bezel.

This MAC ID (and barcode) corresponds to a hexadecimal (base 16) MAC address for a sequence of six consecutive MAC addresses. These six MAC addresses correspond to the server network ports, as shown in the following table.

Oracle Dual Port 25 Gb Ethernet Adapter Hot Plug Is Not Supported

Bug ID: 26713370

Issue: Oracle Dual Port 25 Gb Ethernet Adapters are supported by all supported operating systems. However, Oracle Dual Port 25 Gb Ethernet Adapter hot plug is not supported on Oracle Server X8-8 software release 1.0.0.

Affected Hardware: Oracle Dual Port 25 Gb Ethernet Adapter

Workaround: You must power down the system before removing and replacing Oracle Dual Port 25 Gb Ethernet Adapters.

Oracle ILOM Reports Fault with Oracle Dual Port 25 Gb Ethernet Adapter During System Reset

Bug ID: 26259122

Issue: The Oracle Dual Port 25 Gb Ethernet Adapter can experience a completion timeout fault during a system warm reset operation. The fault is logged by Oracle ILOM.

Affected Hardware: Oracle Dual Port 25 Gb Ethernet Adapter

Workaround: This issue has no functional impact on normal system behavior and can be ignored.

Oracle ILOM Reports Fault alert.chassis.domain.boot.power-on-failed After System Stop

Bug ID: 26629988

Issue: On rare occasion, the Oracle Server X8-8 may remain powered off after the Oracle ILOM start /System command, an SMOD power button press, or after the host reset. When this condition occurs, Oracle ILOM reports the following failure:

alert.chassis.domain.boot.power-on-failed.



Affected Hardware: Oracle Server X8-8

Workaround: Power on the server again. If the second power-on attempt fails, contact an Oracle Service representative for assistance.



BIOS Issues

This section describes important operating notes and known BIOS issues for Oracle Server X8-8.

- SmmFeatures.c(2013) Assert Hang During Power Cycling

SmmFeatures.c(2013) Assert Hang During Power Cycling

Bug ID: 29005470

Issue: In very rare circumstances, Oracle Server X8-8 may experience a delay beginning in early BIOS post, which is detected by the ILOM service processor after 60 minutes, and automatically cleared by reset. The server may experience a long delay before completing BIOS post. The fault is logged by Oracle ILOM.

Affected Hardware: Oracle Server X8-8

Workaround: Wait for the server to automatically recover, or manually reset the server.

Do Not Use the Network Adapter iSCSI Configuration in BIOS

Important Operating Note

There are two locations in the Oracle Server X8-8 system BIOS where you can configure iSCSI settings:

- Advanced → iSCSI Configuration
- Advanced → Broadcom NetXtreme 25G Gigabit Ethernet → iSCSI Boot Configuration Menu

Configure the system iSCSI settings only in Advanced \rightarrow iSCSI Configuration. Do not use the network adapter iSCSI configuration option to configure the system iSCSI settings.

Power Cycle the Server After Changing the Disk Freeze Lock Option

Important Operating Note

A power cycle must be performed on the server after changing the Disk Freeze Lock option in the system BIOS. The Disk Freeze Lock option updates in the BIOS after you select Save & Exit in the BIOS Setup Utility, but the drive remains frozen/locked until a power cycle is performed.

System BIOS Fast Boot Might Not Work Correctly When Updating System Software

Bug ID: 27146850

Issue: The System BIOS Fast Boot feature might not work correctly when updating to a new software release. This issue might occur when updating from system SW1.0.0 or SW1.0.1, to SW1.1.0 or SW1.1.1. This issue is benign and does not cause any problems during the software update.

Affected Hardware: System BIOS

Workaround: Do not preserve the BIOS configuration when updating to a new software release.

DIMM Fault SPX86A-800A-95 - Memtest Single Symbol Test Failed - ILOM 5.1.0.21

Bug ID: 34325538, 34445460

Issue:

Issue: The following DIMM Fault message is seen: SPX86A-800A-95 - Memtest Single Symbol Test Failed (Doc ID 2317012.1) SPX86A-800A-95 indicates that the ILOM fault manager has received an error report indicating a memory DIMM produced correctable errors (CE) during both passes of the memory test.

If the server encounters multiple runtime memory fault related events, increased runtime error messages may be related to DIMM memory testing conditions. Oracle ILOM Adaptive Double DRAM Device Correction (ADDDC) and Post Package Repair (PPR) features are enabled in the server firmware. ADDDC Sparing is a RAS feature to test memory reliability. The Advanced Memory Test (AMT) in the Memory Reference Code (MRC) can fail a DIMM with a single symbol error and then PPR would try to repair the defect.

When enabled, PPR may be able to repair affected DRAM areas on a DIMM. PPR runs when ADDDC was previously activated before reboot or MRC initialization failed memory tests. Upon encountering any memory related fault event during MRC initialization or experiencing certain memory correctable events during runtime that triggers ADDDC on first occurrence, then PPR would be activated after the next system initialization/reboot and attempt to repair the DIMM.





Certain DIMM manufacturers may exhibit different memory failure patterns, and may not support soft PPR configuration (which enables temporarily attempting a repair action).

Affected Hardware: Oracle Server X9-2, Oracle Server X9-2L, Oracle Server X8-8, Oracle Server X8-2, Oracle Server X8-2L, Oracle Server X7-8, Oracle Server X7-2, Oracle Server X7-2L



Not all server systems enable ADDDC.

Affected Software:

The following x86 server software Oracle ILOM releases or later, support PPR (Post-Package Repair).

- Oracle Server X9-2 SW1.1.0 ILOM 5.0.2.21 (Does not enable ADDDC.)
- Oracle Server X9-2L SW1.1.0 ILOM 5.0.2.21 (Does not enable ADDDC.)
- Oracle Server X8-8 SW3.2.2.1 ILOM 5.0.2.22 (Does not enable ADDDC.)
- Oracle Server X8-2 SW3.2.2 ILOM 5.0.2.24
- Oracle Server X8-2L SW3.2.2 ILOM 5.0.2.24
- Oracle Server X7-8 SW3.2.2.1 ILOM 5.0.2.22 (Does not enable ADDDC.)
- Oracle Server X7-2 SW3.2.2 ILOM 5.0.2.24
- Oracle Server X7-2L SW3.2.2 ILOM 5.0.2.24

Workaround: Some DIMM faults are recoverable errors if PPR is enabled on the server. If multiple DIMM memory errors are detected on the server:

- 1. Log in to the Oracle ILOM command-line interface (CLI) using an account with admin (a) role privileges.
- 2. From the Oracle ILOM CLI, launch the Oracle ILOM Fault Management Shell.

```
-> start /SP/faultmgmt/shell
Are you sure you want to start /SP/faultmgmt/shell (y/n)? y
```

Display information about server components using Oracle ILOM FMA CLI command.

```
faultmgmtsp> fmadm faulty
```

4. Manually clear server faults using Oracle ILOM FMA CLI command.

```
faultmgmtsp> fmadm repair <FRU>
```

5. Exit the Oracle ILOM Fault Management Shell and return to the the Oracle ILOM CLI command prompt.

faultmgmtsp> exit



- **6.** Upgrade the server to the latest ILOM/UEFI firmware release that supports PPR. The system resets during the firmware upgrade and runs memory tests again.
- 7. If memory related events faults continue to be logged, replace the faulted DIMMs in the server. Log an Oracle Support case through the support portal for further assistance.

Adaptive Double DRAM Device Correction (ADDDC) is also referred to as Adaptive Device Correction (ADC) in some Oracle documents.

System Might Not Power On with POST After Oracle ILOM Software Upgrade or Downgrade

Important Operating Note

Issue: On rare occasions, after Oracle Server X8-8 Oracle ILOM software upgrade or downgrade, Oracle Server X8-8 might not power on or the Service Processor POST process stops. You can identify the issue if powering on the server system using a chassis power button fails, or Oracle ILOM power-on user interfaces fail, or the HOST_AUTO_POWER_ON policy fails.

Note:

Update your system to the latest Software Release before you use the system. Downgrade software only when required for testing.

Affected Software: Software Release 1.0.0

Affected Hardware: Oracle Server X8-8

Workaround: There are multiple ways to avoid or workaround power cycle issues. Choose from the following methods.

- To avoid power cycle issues when upgrading or downgrading firmware, do not preserve the BIOS configuration.
- You must update your server firmware and software as soon as possible after a new Software Release becomes available. Software releases often include bug fixes, and updating your server ensures that your server has the latest firmware and software. These updates will increase your system performance, security, and stability.



• In general, to minimize the chances of encountering power cycle issues, use the latest software update.



Update your system to the latest Software Release before you use the system. Downgrade software only when required for testing.

- Upgrade software updates in stepwise increments, between major versions. For example: From Software Release 1.0 to Software Release 1.1, From Software Release 1.1 to Software Release 1.2, From Software Release 1.2 to Software Release 1.3.
- On rare occasions, after Oracle Server X8-8 does not power on, first check, then
 view and clear faults using Oracle ILOM FMA (Fault Management Architecture)
 interfaces. For information about Oracle ILOM FMA, refer to Oracle Integrated
 Lights Out Manager (ILOM) 4.0 Information Library at https://www.oracle.com/
 goto/ilom/docs.
- When a power-off condition occurs, press the System A or System B server power button on the host system, or use Oracle ILOM CLI commands to power on the Oracle Server X8-8 host system from a local or remote location. Refer to *Power* On the Server in Oracle Server X8-8 Service Manual.

Recovery: If a system encounters this issue during a firmware upgrade or downgrade, do the following to recover:

From Oracle ILOM CLI:

1. Power off the host.

```
-> stop -script -force /System
```

- 2. Wait 30 seconds.
- 3. Power on the host.

```
-> start -script /System
```

From Oracle ILOM web interface Summary screen:

- 1. Power off the host.
- 2. Wait 30 seconds.
- 3. Power on the host.
- 4. The Administrator can safely clear the fault after recovery.

For details, refer to "Managing Server Hardware Faults Using the Oracle ILOM Fault Management Shell" in the *Oracle Server X8-8 Service Manual*.

If a system encounters this issue during a firmware upgrade or downgrade, and still does not power on after resolving and clearing hardware faults, or does not complete the Service Processor POST process, perform the following steps to power off the host and clear CMOS from the Diag Shell.

Power off the host.

Refer to the Oracle Server X8-8 Installation Guide.

2. Clear system CMOS.



- a. If powered on, force host power off: -> stop -script -force /System
- b. Start the Diag Shell: -> start -script /SP/diag/shell
- c. From the Diag Shell, clear the system CMOS: diag-> hwdiag system clear_cmos
- d. Exit the Diag Shell: diag> exit
- e. Start the host: -> start -script /System
- 3. In the rare case that the Oracle Server X8-8 still fails to power on, perform an AC power cycle, by removing and reinstalling the server AC power cables.

Refer to the Oracle Server X8-8 Service Manual.

 If the AC power cycle attempt fails, contact an Oracle Service representative for assistance.

System Might Not Set BIOS to Defaults After Power Cycle

Bug ID: 26785322

Issue: On rare occasions, typically after an AC power cycle, Oracle Server X8-8 might not set BIOS to defaults. You can identify this issue when the **reset_to_defaults** property does not change from **factory** to **none** after 15 minutes.

To verify the BIOS settings, enter the following command:

```
-> show -d properties
/System/BIOS reset_to_defaults
/System/BIOS
Properties:
reset to defaults = factory
```

Affected Hardware: Oracle Server X8-8

Workaround: If you encounter this issue, log in to Oracle ILOM and reset the service processor (SP) with the following command:

```
-> reset /SP
```

After you reset the SP, re-enter the command to verify the BIOS default settings.

SSL Must Be Turned On When Booting a Redirected ISO Image

Important Operating Note

When booting a redirected ISO image for an operating system installation, SSL (Secure Sockets Layer) must be turned on. This is the default setting. If SSL is not turned on, the installation might stall or fail. This affects all supported operating systems.

Reset Takes a Long Time and Causes the Server to Power Cycle

Important Operating Note



If you have a pending BIOS upgrade, a routine reset takes longer than expected, and causes the server to power cycle and reboot several times. This is expected behavior, as it is necessary to power cycle the server to upgrade the BIOS firmware. If the upgrade includes an FPGA update, it can take as long as 30 minutes to complete the upgrade and the service processor (SP) resets during the process. Since the SP resets during the process, you will need to re-establish any active connection to the SP after the update.

A pending BIOS upgrade exists when the following conditions are true:

- You update the BIOS and service processor firmware using Oracle Integrated Lights Out Manager (ILOM).
- You select the Oracle ILOM option to Delay BIOS Upgrade.
- The host is powered on.

If you reboot the server expecting a routine server reset and instead initiate a (delayed) BIOS upgrade, wait until the upgrade finishes. Do not interrupt the process, as this can result in corrupted firmware and server down time.



Caution:

Firmware corruption and system downtime. Interrupting the firmware upgrade process can corrupt the firmware and render the server inoperable. Do not interrupt the upgrade. Allow the process to finish.



Note:

Oracle ILOM and BIOS updates are designed to work together. When you have a pending BIOS upgrade, it is recommended that you install the upgrade by resetting or power cycling your server as soon as possible.

Oracle VTS Network Test Floods Serial Console Triggering Soft Lockups

Bug ID: 27240264

Issue: The Network test in Oracle VTS floods the Oracle ILOM SP serial console triggering soft lockup events.

Affected Software: Oracle VTS 8.2.0-patch 1.4

Workaround: There are multiple ways to avoid or workaround this issue. Choose one of the following methods.

Disable the Network test (see example below) in the profile and rerun Oracle VTS to resolve the soft lockups issue.



Set the following Network test profile (see example below) and rerun Oracle VTS to resolve soft lockups:

Run Oracle VTS Network test for a shorter time to reduce soft lockup events.

1. Select Options:

```
[*] Network Options idle(Pass=0/Error=0)
```

2. Enter 10 into Test Time. Select Apply.

```
Test Time: [0-99999] 10
```

- 3. Save the profile.
- 4. Restart the test.



Linux Issues

Perform a Yum Update When Using Oracle Linux UEK Kernel

Important Operating Note

When using the Unbreakable Enterprise Kernel Release 4 Update 4 (UEK R4u4) with Oracle Linux 7, perform a yum update to obtain the latest UEK R4 release updates. Oracle Server X8-8 requires Unbreakable Enterprise Kernel version 4.1.12-94.5.7 or later.

Linux MMIO Kernel Configuration Can Affect Oracle Hardware Management Pack fwupdate Tool for Intel NIC/LOM Updates

Important Operating Note

On systems running Linux with Intel network interface cards or LAN-on-Motherboard (LOM) controllers, if MMIO memory access is set to strict access in the Linux kernel (iomem=strict or as part of the kernel build configuration) you will see the following message in syslog/dmeg when running the Oracle Hardware Management Pack fwupdate tool:

```
kernel: Program fwupdate tried to access /dev/mem between c4a00000->c4a01000. (Address may vary)
```

This message is expected and should not cause an issue with the operation of the operating system. There will be one message each time fwupdate is run and the kernel is in strict MMIO access mode.

However, when the kernel is running in this mode, fwupdate will not be able to access Intelbased network controllers to either list information or update firmware.



NVMe Phantom Drives Appear When Using Windows Server 2016 Inbox Drivers

Bug ID: 32158109

Issue: During Windows Server 2016 installation on a system with an NVMe storage drive, Windows Setup lists the NVMe storage device and 127 phantom listings of the same NVMe storage device. These phantom storage devices each show a total size and free space of 0.0 MB. For example:



After you install Windows Server 2016, the 127 phantom drives also appear in Windows Device Manager. This issue is due to an out-of-date inbox Windows Server 2016 NVMe driver that does not support the multiple namespace feature of some NVMe storage devices.

Affected Software: Microsoft Windows Server 2016, version 1607 (OS build 14393.3986).

Affected Hardware: Any system with NVMe storage drives that supports multiple namespaces.

Workaround: After Windows Server 2016 is installed, perform a Microsoft Windows Update. A newer version of the Windows Server 2016 NVMe driver installs and corrects the issue. After the update, the phantom drives are no longer listed for your NVMe storage device.

NVMe Hot-Plug Is Not Supported

Important Operating Note

NVMe storage drives are supported by the Microsoft Windows Server 2019 and Windows Server 2016 operating systems. However, NVMe hot-plug is not supported on Oracle Server X8-8 under Windows Server 2019 and Windows Server 2016. You must power down the system before removing and replacing NVMe storage drives.

Windows Server Hot-Plug Requires Registry Changes

Bug ID: 26053145

Issue: The workaround is required for hot-plug to work with Windows Server 2019 and Windows Server 2016. Even with the workaround, NVMe hot-plug is not supported, as explained in the previous Product Note, *NVMe Hot Plug Is Not Supported*.

Affected Software: Microsoft Windows Server Windows Server 2019 and Windows Server 2016

Workaround: To add the Parameter key to the pci service in the Windows registry, and enter a mask value for each root port associated with the NVMe devices, do the following:

- Import the .reg file.
- 2. From the Windows Desktop, press the **Windows key+R** or select **Start** → **Run**.
- 3. Type regedit.
- 4. Navigate to

 HKEY LOCAL MACHINE\SYSTEM\CurrentControlSet\Services\pci.
- 5. Right-click pci and select New → Key.
- **6.** To name the Key, type: Parameters.
- 7. Right-click Parameters and select New → Binary Value.



8. For each new binary value, type the following names and values:

2nd	80862031	00 00 00 10 00 00 00 00

VMware ESXi Issues

- NVMe Hot Plug Is Not Supported

NVMe Hot Plug Is Not Supported

Important Operating Note

Issue: NVMe storage drives are supported by VMware ESXi 6.7 U1 technology. However, NVMe hot plug is not supported on Oracle Server X8-8 using VMware ESXi 6.7 U1 technology. You must power down the system before removing and replacing NVMe storage drives.

Incorrect PCIe Card Storage Capacity is Displayed with VMware ESXi 6.7 U1

Bug ID: 29299681

Issue: Only half of the storage capacity of an Oracle Flash Accelerator F640 PCIe card is displayed when using the VMware ESXi 6.7 U1 technology. If the card has 6.4 Terabytes of storage space, it is displayed as having 3.2 Terabytes of space.

Workaround: To view accurate storage capacity for the PCIe card, download the nvme driver from the VMware Drivers and Tools web site at: https://my.vmware.com/web/vmware/details?downloadGroup=DT-ESX65-INTEL-INTEL-NVME-1328&productId=614

Firmware and Software Updates

Firmware and software for your server are updated periodically. These updates are made available as software releases. The software releases are a set of downloadable files (patches) that include all available firmware, software, hardware drivers, tools, and utilities for the server. All of these files have been tested together and verified to work with your server.

You must update your server firmware and software as soon as possible after a new software release becomes available. Software releases often include bug fixes, and updating your server ensures that your server has the latest firmware and software. These updates will increase your system performance, security, and stability.

To determine which firmware version is installed on your server, you can use either the Oracle ILOM web interface or the command-line interface (CLI).

- From the web interface, click System Information → Summary, then view the property value for System Firmware Version in the General Information table.
- From the CLI, at the command prompt, type: show /System/Firmware

The server Product Notes list the current server software release and firmware version that are available.

Firmware and Software Update Options

Use one of the following options to update your server to the latest firmware and software:

 My Oracle Support – All system software releases are available from the My Oracle Support web site at https://support.oracle.com. For information about what is available from the My Oracle Support web site, see Software Releases.

 Other Methods – You can use Oracle Enterprise Manager Ops Center, Oracle Hardware Management Pack, or Oracle ILOM to update your server software and firmware.

Software Releases

Software releases on My Oracle Support are grouped by product family (such as Oracle Server), then the product (the specific server), and finally the software release version. A software release contains all the updated software and firmware for your server as a set of downloadable files (patches), including firmware, drivers, tools, or utilities, all tested together to be compatible with your server.

Each patch is within a zip file that contains set of firmware and software subdirectories and files, along with a ReadMe file. The ReadMe file provides information about the patch, such as what has changed since the prior software release and the bugs that have been fixed in the current release.

My Oracle Support provides the set of software releases for your server as described in the following table. You can obtain these software releases by downloading the files from My Oracle Support.

Download Firmware and Software Updates From My Oracle Support

- 1. Go to the My Oracle Support web site: https://support.oracle.com.
- 2. Sign in to My Oracle Support.
- 3. At the top of the page, click the Patches & Updates tab.
 - The Patch Search pane appears at the right of the screen.
- 4. Within the Search tab area, click Product or Family (Advanced).
 - The Search tab area appears with search fields.
- **5.** In the Product field, select the product from the drop-down list.
 - Alternatively, type a full or partial product name (for example, Oracle Server X8-8) until a match appears.
- 6. In the Release field, select a software release from the drop-down list.
 - Expand the list to see all available software releases.
- 7. Click Search.

The Patch Advanced Search Results screen appears, listing the patches for the software release.

- See Software Releases for a description of the available software releases.
- **8.** To select a patch for a software release, click the patch number next to the software release version.
 - You can use the Shift key to select more than one patch.
 - A pop-up action panel appears. The panel contains several action options, including the ReadMe, Download, and Add to Plan options. For information about the Add to Plan option, click the associated button and select "Why use a plan?".
- 9. To review the ReadMe file for this patch, click ReadMe.
- **10.** To download the patch for the software release, click Download.
- **11.** In the File Download dialog box, click the patch zip file name.

The patch for the software release downloads. The download is an archive zip file, which you must extract to find the directory containing the image.pkg file

Update System Firmware Using Oracle ILOM

 Determine the Oracle ILOM firmware version currently installed on the system. At the Oracle ILOM prompt, type: show /System/Firmware



Download the Firmware Pack (Patch) update from My Oracle Support.



This procedure uses the Oracle ILOM command-line interface to update the system firmware. You can also update system firmware using the Oracle ILOM web interface. For web interface instructions, refer to the Oracle ILOM documentation at https://www.oracle.com/goto/ilom/docs.

To update system firmware, follow these steps:

You can update Oracle ILOM system firmware while the host is powered on. The Oracle ILOM firmware image includes firmware for the service processor (SP, Oracle ILOM) and the server's host components (FPGAs). The Oracle ILOM firmware update goes into immediate effect. However, the update of host components is deferred until the affected host is power cycled. Because Oracle ILOM can be updated while the host is powered on, this feature reduces the total system downtime.

- 1. Notify Oracle ILOM SP users of the scheduled firmware update and ask them to close all client sessions until after the firmware update is complete. Do not perform any other Oracle ILOM tasks during the firmware update.
- 2. Navigate to the directory where you saved the FIRMWARE PACK (Patch) archive zip file.
- 3. Extract the FIRMWARE PACK files from the archive zip file.

When you extract the files, the <image.pkg> file is in the Firmware/service-processor directory.

For example:

```
% unzip p26981570_102_Generic.zip
Archive: 26981570_102_Generic.zip
creating Oracle_Server_X7-2-1.0.2.87665-FIRMWARE_PACK/Firmware/service-
processor/
inflating: Oracle_Server_X7-2-1.0.2.87665-FIRMWARE_PACK/Firmware/service-
processor/
ILOM-4 0 0 28 r121827-ORACLE SERVER X7-2-rom.pkg
```

- **4.** Review the README file that accompanies the firmware image to be aware of any special release notes or instructions.
- **5.** Update the firmware using the Oracle ILOM command-line interface:
 - a. Log in to Oracle ILOM with an account with Admin privileges.
 - b. Load the firmware image from the stored location using the load -source command followed by the directory path to the firmware image you want to install. Type:

```
-> load -source protocol://server_IPaddress/<path_to_image>/
<image.pkg>
```

```
Where protocol can be: http, https, ftp, tftp, sftp, scp
```

For example, if you are accessing the server through a tftp server with an IP address of 198.51.100.123 in a directory called <code>ilom/jdoe</code> and with the <image.pkg> named firmware.pkg, enter the following command:



-> load -source tftp://198.51.100.123/tftpboot/ilom/jdoe/ firmware.pkg

The following information is displayed:

An upgrade takes several minutes to complete. Oracle ILOM will enter a special mode to load new firmware. No other tasks can be performed in Oracle ILOM until the firmware upgrade is complete and Oracle ILOM is reset.

You can choose to postpone the server BIOS upgrade until the next server power off. If you do not do that, you should perform a clean shutdown of the server before continuing.

c. Answer the following prompts:

Are you sure you want to load the specified file? y Preserve existing SP configuration (y/n)? y

This prompt preserves your existing Oracle ILOM settings after the firmware update is complete.

Preserve existing BIOS configuration (y/n)? y

This prompt preserves your existing BIOS configuration settings after the firmware upgrade is complete.

Delay BIOS upgrade until the next poweroff or reset (y/n)? y

Answer "Y" (yes) to the Delay BIOS Upgrade question and, if the host is ON and there are host components to be updated, the host remains powered on and the host component updates are deferred until the next time the host powers off and powers on (next reset/reboot).

Answer "N" (no) to the Delay BIOS Upgrade question and, if the host is ON and there are host components to be updated, the host is forced OFF so that host component updates can be applied immediately. After Oracle ILOM reboots, the host is powered on automatically if it was forced off.



If the server has a pending BIOS upgrade, the power reset could take longer to complete. This is expected behavior, as it is necessary to power cycle the server to upgrade the BIOS firmware. If the upgrade includes an FPGA update, the process can take as long as 26 minutes to complete.

- **d.** Wait for the Oracle ILOM status message to confirm that the process is complete.
- 6. To verify that the updated firmware is installed, at the Oracle ILOM prompt, type:
 - -> show /System/Firmware

Installing System Firmware Using Other Methods

In addition to using Oracle ILOM, you can install firmware and software updates using one of the following methods:

• Oracle Enterprise Manager Ops Center – Use Oracle Enterprise Manager Ops Center to automatically download the latest firmware from Oracle and then install the firmware



onto one or more servers. Firmware updates can also be loaded manually into the Enterprise Controller.
